this study combines a descriptive and theoretical presentation of konni a gur language of northern ghana it presents an optimality theory analysis of the entire phonological system the descriptions are separated from the formal analyses in order to facilitate use by both descriptivists and theoreticians morphology is described including the noun class system reduplicative agentive nouns noun adjective complexes nominal derivations and various verbal aspectual suffixes major sections are included on consonants vowels and tone the volume also includes a brief syntax sketch co occurrence restrictions phoneme frequency counts measurements of segment durations and vowel formants and seven appendices of data selected notes of interest some phonology is limited to only certain noun classes the 9 vowel atr vowel system and diphthongization are integrally related certain vowels assimilate only across consonants having the same place feature tonal perturbations require four different underlying representations for different nouns which have a surface lh tone true tonal polarity is distinct from dissimilation

two cases of syntax phonology interface are demonstrated michael cahill ph d linguistics the ohio state university 1999 has been with sil since 1982 and worked on site with konni speakers from 1986 to 1993 he was a member of the lsa s committee on endangered languages and their preservation from 2001 2003 chairing it in 2003 he is an adjunct faculty member of the university of texas at arlington and of the graduate institute of applied linguistics and is currently based in dallas as the international linguistics coordinator of sil

constraint based frameworks such as optimality theory ot have significantly altered phonologists views on the nature of derivations and their role in linguistic theory earlier frameworks of generative phonology were characterized by a fairly complicated theory of derivations involving lexical levels the cycle and intrinsic and extrinsic rule ordering among other things ot in its standard form on the other hand represents a minimalist theory of derivations recognizing only a direct mapping from input to output this volume addresses questions from many different points of view by a number of outstanding scholars is this minimal theory sufficiently well equipped to deal with the empirical complications of natural language or do we need a larger derivational residue in our theory what are the relevant facts and how can we deal with them are there any reasons to think that an ot based approach to derivations may even be more successful than its rule based competitors the book also features an introduction into the general issues involved and an extensive bibliography

phonological architecture bridges linguistic theory and the biological sciences presenting a comprehensive view of phonology from a biological perspective its back to basics approach breaks phonology into primitive operations and representations and investigates their possible origins in cognitive abilities found throughout the animal kingdom bidget samuels opens the discussion by considering the general properties of the externalisation system in a theory neutral manner using animal cognition studies to identify which components of phonology may not be unique to humans and or to language she demonstrates on the basis of behavioural and physiological studies on primates songbirds and a wide variety of other species that the cognitive abilities underlying human phonological representations and operations are present in creatures other than homo sapiens even if not to the same degree and in domains other than phonology or indeed language proper the second more linguistically technical half of the book explores what is necessarily unique about phonology the author discusses the properties of the phonological module which are dictated by the interface requirements of the syntactic module of universal grammar as well as different components of the human sensory motor system ie audition vision and motor control she proposes a repertoire of phonological representations and operations which are consistent with universal grammar and human cognitive evolution she illustrates the application of these operations with analyses of representative phonological data such as vowel harmony reduplication and tone spreading patterns finally the author addresses the issue of cross linguistic and inter speaker variation

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
