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the bible has inspired western art and literature for centuries so it is no surprise that christian iconography characters and stories have also appeared in many comic books yet the sheer stylistic range of these comics is stunning they include books from christian publishers as well as underground comix with religious themes and a vast array of dc marvel and dark horse titles from hellboy to preacher christianity and comics presents an 80 year history of the various ways that the comics industry has drawn from biblical source material it explores how some publishers specifically targeted christian audiences with titles like catholic comics books featuring heroic versions of oral roberts and billy graham and special religious themed editions of archie but it also considers how popular mainstream comics like daredevil the sandman ghost rider and batman are infused with christian themes and imagery comics scholar blair davis pays special attention to how the medium s unique use of panels word balloons captions and serialized storytelling have provided vehicles for telling familiar biblical tales in new ways spanning the golden age of comics to the present day this book charts how comics have both reflected and influenced americans changing attitudes towards religion

in nourishing caregiver collaborations elevating home experiences and classroom practices for collective care nawal qarooni invites us to step beyond school centric one off events and practices to create more authentic engaging collaborations with caregivers instead of asking what families can do to support schools qarooni asks how schools can identify and

celebrate what families already inherently bring to their children's literacy learning establishing this work in holistic teaching a pedagogical mindset that affirms the importance of loving the whole child through compassionate collective care qarooni explores five critical literacy tenets by highlighting opportunities to listen for honor connect to and elevate family strengths while inviting them even further into our shared work and encouraging reflection around recognizing the journey of process celebrating the role collaboration plays within the collective using observational literacy to read the world advocating for the power of talk to grow ideas and connect with others giving children choice to make self directed decisions with moments of memoir woven in alongside diverse family examples and classroom stories connected to realistic instructional practices qarooni shows how all families contribute meaningfully to their children's literacy lives discover how we can tap into those vast wells to support learning at home and in school while building positive reciprocal relationships across both settings with an afterword by en comunidad authors carla españa and luz yadira herrera nourishing caregiver collaborations is rooted in the simple truth that we cannot separate knowing our students from knowing their home communities and the people that they love this book offers a toolkit for connecting with families and elevating the intrinsic strengths that reside in every child's home

designed to help readers become critical thinkers about technology not simply consumers of technology the readings span a broad range of topics and genres and include alternative readings available on a world wide site connected to the book an abundance of writing to learn and writing to communicate assignments provide practice in crafting reflective pieces thoughtful analyses of issues argumentative discourse research proposals multimedia projects and other kinds of electronic writing aimed at on line discussion groups

essays in this fascinating and important collection examine the lifestyles and attitudes of the gentry in late medieval england they consider the emergence of the gentry as a group distinct from the nobility and explore the various available routes to gentility through surveys of the gentry's military background administrative and political roles social behaviour and education the reader is provided with an overview of how the group's culture evolved and how it was disseminated studies of the gentry's literacy creation and use of literature cultural networks religious activities and their experiences of music and the visual arts more directly address the practice and expression of this culture exploring the extent to which the gentry's activities were different from those of the wider population joining the editors in contributing essays to this collection is an impressive array of eminent scholars all specialists in their respective fields christine carpenter peter fleming maurice keen philippa maddern nicholas orme tim shaw thomas toley and deborah youngs as a whole the book offers a broad view of gentry culture that explores reassesses and sometimes even challenges the idea that members of the gentry cultivated their own distinctive cultural identity it will appeal to students looking for a comprehensive introduction to late medieval gentry culture as well as to researchers interested in gentry studies more generally

this volume illuminates the contemporary work of teacher scholars who take critical pedagogy one step further demonstrating new ways to connect critical literacy to classroom practice it is one of a three volume series devoted to the teachings of paulo freire

place for young learners supported by dr morrow s extensive research in motivation theory and exemplary instruction here are sound ideas that engage students collaboratively and independently you can spend time teaching small groups of students attending to their individual needs all the while knowing the rest of your class will be independently engaged in real learning the book is divided into two distinct parts the first section gives the research background and rationale for using literacy centers it provides the tools for thoughtful design and use of centers along with helpful hints on how best to motivate students the second section provides activities for modeling literature to interest children in reading in social collaborative settings these activities are designed to foster the development of comprehension skills and strategies through the use of children s literature the book gives equal time to the development of word study skills such as phonemic awareness and phonics with manipulative materials to ensure fluent reading included are smart suggestions for introducing centers management ideas black line masters ways to foster student collaboration and cooperation ways to assess students center work and suggestions for promoting student accountability a completely new section on word study phonics and phonemic awareness practical and effective suggestions for family involvement the literacy center can help you develop your students enthusiasm for reading and writing it is perfect for introducing pre service teachers to classrooms that are literacy rich and purposeful as well as for continuing staff development for classroom teachers who are seeking better ways to engage students in reading and writing

this book introduces and explores a new pedagogical approach aesthetic positive pedagogy app for teachers and students in a variety of educational contexts the book is built on the need for educational institutions and communities to seriously consider a strong positive approach to learning and teaching ultimately leading to a better world based on pre existing philosophies such as positive pedagogy and critical pedagogy app encourages teachers to carefully consider their language use as well as other modal resources in the classroom using aesthetic experience as a core to learning teachers can embed an approach to learning and teaching that supports wellbeing and resilience as well as caring and compassionate citizenship in their students the authors outline what an app approach to learning and teaching looks feels and sounds like in different educational contexts such as in schools and higher education and explore how it might be implemented in face to face as well as online learning the book s findings will apply to postgraduate students and academics in education and the creative arts as well as teachers and leaders in schools
